
Selma to Montgomery 065, a determined group of 600 people marched from Selma to Montgomer to protect that blacks were not allowed to vote in total they mare

In 1965, a determined group of 600 people marched from Selma to Montgomery, Alabama to protest that blacks were not allowed to vote. In total, they marched 54 miles. Follow the directions to mark important events on the map.



- 1. Color the circle near Selma yellow to mark where the marches began.
- 2. On March 7th, 600 civil rights workers were attacked by the police. Praw a red X near Selma for the event later called "Bloody Sunday".
- 3. On March 9th, Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. led a march to the Edmund Pettus Bridge to commemorate Bloody Sunday. Draw a bridge between Selma and Casey.
- 3. On March 24th, 300 of the marches camped near Lowndesboro. Praw a campsite near Lowndesboro and color the circle green.
- 4. Draw a yellow star near Montgomery for the Stars for Freedom rally, where popular musicians played for the marchers.
- 5. Connect all the towns with a black line to show the path of the march, then circle Montgomery with the same color to show where it ended.
